Gardens lived up mostly to expectation. Our first stop at Stone House Cottage and Nursery was a lovely cottage type garden with some unusual plants in the nursery. This was really the only opportunity to buy, though our visit to the new RHS Bridgewater Garden had some expensive offerings. The garden there is still developing and might be worth a revisit in 5 years, but the highlight for many was meeting up with Jean Robinson, who was our secretary for many years... oh Jean, on so many fronts you are truly missed.

We were warmly welcomed at Gawsworth Hall by two brothers Jonny and Rupert, who were on hand to pour tea and give us a history of the beautiful 15 century house and their mum gave a great insight as we toured the building.

A first for many of us was the National Trust Biddulph Grange garden..... very Victorian, with grottoes, natural stone mounds and Italianate borders.

For some the best was kept until last – no true garden but a national memorial set in a sweeping 150 acres of arboretum. With too little time we were packed into a 'land train' with an excellent commentary over the loudspeakers telling the harrowing stories of bravery from our armed forces. This is really worth a second longer visit. Following a long journey home, we were back in Milford, in glorious sunshine, in time for Marigold to go bellringing!!
